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
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ABOUTUS

CEO MESSAGE

The school year 2018-19 already seems so distant, yet it was a year during which so much happened within LEARN and the environment in which we operate.

uring the course of this year, we found ourselves with a new government, a new Minister of Education, a new Assistant Deputy Minister, and a new Chair for our Board of Directors. For many, they had no idea of who and what LEARN is and does, and as a result, we had to address this situation. In addition, we had several new members on our board who were unfamiliar with us. Change is a challenge at the best of times, but when it occurs in abundance and high speed, it can be "interesting." All that being said, it remains a year where we provided professional learning to over 5000 participants, where we delivered nearly 9000 tutorial sessions, where our Provincial Resource Team intervened several hundred times in support and development of the Community Learning Network. It was gratifying that community partners reached out to us for our expertise in e-learning, coding, makerspaces, and community networking. The English Language Art Network partnered with LEARN on a 4-year program that will bring

\$4M of support into our English schools. CHSSN continued its partnership with LEARN by providing grants to a number of schools. We partnered with La Tablée des Chefs helping young adults develop life skills. Our Virtual Campus served hundreds of students across the province, allowing them to take courses they might otherwise not be able to take, or to complete Summer School online. All of these services were at the request of our community, which we are proud to serve.

It was indeed a busy year, but what invariably happens is that success breeds success. The coming year looks like it will be one with even more challenges and more requests. There is a lot of change on the horizon, but I am sure we will be up to the challenge, and that as a community, we will succeed.



PROFESSIONAL LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

Strategic Goal:

Provide professional learning opportunities for educators.

Professional learning opportunities include:

- Workshops and sessions held at the LEARN office
- Hands-on workshops and presentations at provincial conferences and local school boards
- On-site support provided in collaboration with school board consultants
- On-going support for teacher professional development and innovation grants (PDIG)

In 2018-2019, a total of 161 Professional Learning sessions were offered reaching more than 5,466 participants this school year. Our workshops and pedagogical support sessions were held at the LEARN office, in schools and school boards as well as local events. Our team presented at a number of provincial conferences in 2018-2019, including RÉCIT FCC, BJEC, RemixEd, QPAT, ACPI, CCI 2018, AQEFLS, and AQUOPS.

REMIXED CAMP 2018

On Saturday, October 27th, LEARN partnered with Pure and Applied and Concordia University for the fourth installment of RemixEd Camp (Ed Camp format), an unconference by educators for educators.



MAST has been discussing alternative means of evaluation in order to move away from summative exams and towards a more progressive formative assessment. Sample assessments were prepared for 2018-2019 school year.

DEVELOPMENTAL LITERACY CONTINUUM

Strategic Goal:

Support for evaluation for learning through the Developmental Literacy Continuum

The Developmental Literacy Continuum (DLC) is a Formative Assessment tool for teachers. Students can be plotted on a continuum to situate where they are in their literacy development (determining their zone of proximal development) in three strands of language learning: Reading, Writing, and Talk. A paper guide describes the phases of development as well as the individual indicators which are also online. The guide also provides teaching strategies for teachers to help in the planning of further instruction once a student is situated within the continuum.

In 2018-2019, training sessions and support were provided at the following schools, as well as ongoing support to the network of users:

- SWLSB, Grenville Elementary School school-wide implementation with ongoing training and support in formative assessment and curricular planning based on DLC data. The focus in 2018-2019 was adding READING.
- SWLSB, Grenville Elementary School using DLC for I.E.P. planning
- SWLSB, JFK elementary, training teachers on using DLC for formative assessment - 2 sessions to date.
- SWLSB, training consultants on DLC so they can provide support in an ongoing way and initiate where needed (Laval Senior, Laval Junior).
- **Riverside School Board** Sessions in September & October to train new Resource Teachers on using the DLC for modified students in elementary.

SPECIAL NEEDS

Strategic Goal:

Support use of assistive technologies and inclusion practices such as differentiation and Universal Design for Learning.

Highlights for 2018-2019

- Updates were made to the Special Needs section of the website related to including assistive technology in the classroom. Support was provided to the anglophone RECIT network on admissible adaptations for MEES evaluations with respect to technology.
- Ongoing work with RSB and SWLSB consultants and teachers in using the Developmental Literacy Continuum for Formative Assessment and in writing I.E.P.'s for challenging students.
- New section on living with autism was published online presenting 21 video clips of conversations with an autistic person. <u>www.learnquebec.ca/autism</u>

PEDAGOGICAL SUPPORT

Strategic Goals:

Provide pedagogical support to schools and school boards in a variety of ways through pilot projects, PDIG grants and PLCs;

Encourage pedagogical practices that reflect rigorous and relevant research through collaboration on research projects with a variety of partners;

Partner with universities that provide teacher training programs to better integrate pre-service teachers into the English education community.

PASSEPORT DE PRISE DE RISQUES EN LANGUE SECONDE AU QUÉBEC

In collaboration with the University of Ottawa, LEARN is developing 3 linguistic risk-taking passports: one for Elementary, one for Secondary FLS, and one for Family - early childhood (2 to 8 years old). These passports include a list of risks that some language learners may shy away from or who may need special encouragement to engage in. This initiative intends to encourage students to take various linguistic risks in their second official language. In 2018-2019, the passport was adapted by LEARN and will be piloted in 2019. www.learnquebec.ca/passeport

MICRO:BIT PILOT

LEARN supported a pilot project aimed at integrating the Micro:Bit into the Math and Science classroom. With our partners, Kids Code Jeunesse, SWLSB, and LBPSB, we are developing and sharing best practices aligned with our Quebec curriculum for the teaching and learning of computational thinking and fluency through the use of hands-on learning with a microcontroller. The project was launched with a two-day PD session with the participating teachers and consultants from SWLSB, LBPSB, and Kids Code Jeunesse. We have worked with teachers from Twin Oaks Elementary, Souvenir Elementary,

MacDonald High School, and Westwood Junior High School to explore in their classrooms. Kids Code Jeunesse has generously supplied the Micro:bit microcontrollers for over 200 students. LEARN, LBPSB, and SWLSB consultants provided the support throughout the year for the integration of the tool into the classroom. The LEARN team visited every classroom along with school board consultants to support the students and teachers to add peripherals (like sensors and actuators) to the Micro:bit. The project was documented and resources have been shared through a website: sites.google.com/learnquebec.ca/microbit/home. The second phase of the project will continue in 2019-2020 with some teachers from the pilot project as well as new collaborators.



I really enjoyed the way the day was structured. We were able to have offline and online examples that I was able to pass on to colleagues. We played all afternoon and were exposed to tons of examples of products and projects. I appreciate the access to a variety of tools. Often we see tools online but do not know if they would be a good fit for the classroom, so this way we can try. LEARN also has a fantastic library. Everyone I meet at Open Creative spaces is willing to chat about their work in schools and about their projects during the day.

STEAM IN KINDERGARTEN

In collaboration with 3 teachers from SWLSB and Professor Sheryl Gilman-Smith from McGill's Education department, we worked to develop a Maker Mindset approach to STEAM that is aligned with the Preschool education program and pedagogical approach. The action research project took place from October 2017 to June 2018. Both the research and classroom experimentation process were documented with text, audio, video and photos.

The objective for 2018-2019 was the development of a STEAM in Kindergarten workshop as well as the production of support pages online and related dissemination strategies that will allow teachers to experience and implement this preschool approach.

COMMUNITY SERVICE LEARNING

Strategic Goal:

(In collaboration with the PRT)

Provide support for Community Service Learning projects through the mobilization of provincial partners (CHSSN, ELAN, QWF, QAHN, QLF) to collaborate on projects that engage community in local history, health and well-being, art and literacy.

O Community Service Learning is a teaching strategy that helps students to acquire academic and social education goals while meeting an authentic community need. CSL projects are great ways to support student success, student engagement and active citizenship (as well as a school's MESA goals). They can also serve as a meaningful way to build or strengthen relationships between school (s) and community. A number of schools in the CLC Network have been engaging in CSL projects for many years. Our goal is to share examples and provide resources to expand the strategy across the Anglophone sector.

♦ A CSL section of the LEARN website was recently developed to share tools, resources and stories of success. This includes project planning templates and resources in English and French. There is a particular emphasis on the incorporation of student voice in developing Community Service Learning projects.



ACCENT QUEBEC

Strategic Goal:

This project is being developed in partnership with LEARN, Canadian Parents for French, LBPSB, and the Office of the Commissioner of Official Languages. The goal of this initiative is to support cultural enrichment and bilingualism by hosting a repertoire of activities and recreational resources, and cultural activities that are available in French to the English-speaking community (teachers, parents and community members) in Quebec. The directory was launched at the AQEFLS conference on April 13th, 2018. In 2018-2019, the project team worked in collaboration with the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts to develop an Accent Quebec certification. The purpose of this certification is to create bridges between cultural institutions of Quebec and families or groups learning French as a second language (FLS) by proposing activities in simple and accessible French. We plan on developing documentation and supplementary training as well as self-paced multimedia guides (videos, clips, etc.) which would permit Quebec cultural institutions to adapt their previously created educational activities into simple French for second-language learners. These activities will be promoted on the Accent Quebec website as well as social media networks and profiles. 





SUMMER SCHOOL

he summer school courses were offered online, in real-time, by qualified subject teachers from across the province. All secondary students registered in an English School Board within the province could access this service, if needed. These services were for students who had already completed a year of study in a course and who:

- wished to improve their final results or,
- did not receive a passing grade as a final result and wished to rewrite the final exam,
- were approved by their School Board to take a summer course,
- had earned a grade of at least 50%.

A Summer School Coordinator was hired to manage the 2019 LEARN Virtual Summer School Session. An information kit, with pamphlets, was sent to all high schools in all School Boards, with details of how to access this service. Online sessions began on July 11th, 2019 and ended on July 26th, 2019. The courses listed below were offered based on enrollment, with a minimum number of 7 to 8 students per course. An administration fee of \$250 was charged to each participant. In certain situations, school boards provided payment for students who did not have the means to cover the cost.






dditionally, the PRT advocates for the CLC Initiative as a whole, enabling all CLCs, schools and school boards to benefit from greater recognition and community support.

THE CLC NETWORK AT A GLANCE

The CLC network currently includes **46 CLCs** in **10 school boards**, and **86 schools**. There is also 1 CLC in a private school, Hebrew Academy.

Currently, the network is supported by Community Development Agents (CDAs) in:





ith over 1630 programs and unique activities offered throughout the 2018-19 school year, the 86 schools engaged in the CLC Initiative continue to make significant contributions to the communities they serve:

CLCs secured more than \$786,754 in grants and donations and over \$1,035,000 of in-kind contributions (value of volunteer hours and material donations).

This year's activities and programming, developed and delivered in collaboration with local and regional partners, primarily contributed to the health and wellbeing of citizens of all ages, student perseverance, youth retention, and early childhood education.

 A majority (85%) of Community Development Agents (CDAs) participated in local tables de concertations. Members of these intersectoral tables work together to enhance community-based services.
 CDAs are often the only representative of the Englishspeaking community at these tables.

HIGHLIGHTS 2018-19



BOARD-WIDE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT SESSIONS

In collaboration with school board representatives, the PRT led 7 custom professional development sessions with over 90 CLC principals, vice-principals, CDAs and teachers in 7 school boards. This year's PD sessions focused on effective practices for CLCs working with multiple schools, community service learning, strategic planning and family engagement strategies.

The following impacts have been reported or observed:

- Increased adoption of featured programs & strategies (e.g., Kitchen Brigades)
- Increased collaboration between teachers and CDAs
- Increased activity in extended model sites;
- Increase in CDA presence at new school sites
- Increased offers of programming for families
- Improved attitude and sense of teamwork



ORIENTATION & TRAINING OF NEW CDAS

A two-day training session for 5 new CLC Community Development Agents (CDAs) was held at LEARN in October. Training was offered remotely to 7 more CDAs as they were hired over the course of the school year.

COMMUNITY SERVICE LEARNING (CSL)

LEARN works to support community vitality and student success across Quebec through the promotion of Community Service Learning (CSL), a pedagogical strategy that empowers students to learn by working with their community to address authentic community needs. This year the PRT hosted 4 successful CSL events for educators and produced a video highlighting CSL activities in CLC schools.

• A Community Service Learning 'Camp' brought teachers, consultants, CDAs and community partners together to participate in a Design Thinking process aimed at developing learning experiences that empower students of all ages to address authentic needs in their classroom, school and community.

Two webinars were offered during 2018-2019:

The Shoreline Project Webinar, in collaboration with Concordia University professor Liz Miller, was offered to high schools interested in engaging students on how individuals, societies and the environment are interconnected – locally, nationally and globally.

• Birding Webinar, hosted with two teachers and a community partner from Bird Protection Quebec.

LEARN/McGill School-Community Garden Institute - brought together teachers, school staff, principals and community partners working to build/maintain a sustainable school-community garden. The PRT is offering a Harvest Institute in Fall 2019 and explore ways to bring these resources/opportunities to different regions of Quebec.

EXTENDED MODELS: RESEARCH & DISSEMINATION

An extended model refers to a growing trend within the CLC network where an established CLC (servicing one school) begins working with multiple schools in a common region in a coordinated fashion.

The establishment of extended models emerged as a strategy to improve equity across Quebec schools wanting access to Community Learning Centres (and CDAs). There are currently 11 extended CLCs associated encompassing 44 schools across the network.

To support the establishment and success of extended models, the PRT released a research report in the fall of 2018 based on case studies of 5 extended models. The study has helped to identify effective

practices and structural conditions, while also identifying common pitfalls.

Following the release of the report, the PRT led 8 workshops and presentations to

disseminate findings further and encourage application. These sessions were attended by 86 school board representatives, principals and CDAs and have contributed to enhanced principal leadership and communication, structural changes to CDA resource distribution and a renewed focus on the development of initiatives that compliment 2 or more school sites.

The goal yesterday was to review some of the best practices and challenges, while also allowing for an open & honest dialogue with our administrative team was not only timely but in my mind, somewhat long-overdue. The PRT created 20 new tools and resources for CLC leaders, including a research report on extended models and a practitioner's guide, infographics promoting parental engagement strategies based on Dr. Joyce Epstein's highly-regarded framework, survey and service agreement templates, a curated list of current and upcoming grant opportunities as well as project planning tools for teachers.

PROFESSIONAL LEARNING COMMUNITIES (PLCS)

The PRT hosted four themed PLCs for Community Development Agents in 2018-2019. Themes included:

- Working with Multiple Schools
- CDA Launchpad (for new CDAs)
- Family & Parent Engagement and
- Early Childhood Education

A total of 12 sessions were offered virtually with more than 70% of all CDAs in the network participating in one or more sessions. During each session, CDAs were invited to share resources and effective practices, as well as explore common challenges. The PRT additionally showcased relevant tools, resources, programming and funding opportunities.



FAMILY ENGAGEMENT & SUPPORT

CLC school teams requested resources that would further engage families in education.*

The PRT worked with a student intern from McGill's Department of Educational and Counselling Psychology to conduct a literature review of evidence-based practices in Family Engagement in schools. Aligning this information with the MEES Policy on Educational Success and 0-8 strategy, the PRT developed tools and professional development opportunities, piloted by 5 CLC schools, including:

- A parent survey template
- A survey for school staff
- 3 infographics
- A survey results template

Fourteen CDAs signed up for the virtual exchange series on Parent and Family Engagement centered around developing school-community partnerships to support increased parent/family engagement. A "Guide to Inscreasing Parents and Family Engagement in School" will be launched in the fall.

FAMILY PASSPORT PROJECT

The PRT is collaborating with LEARN's Pedagogical Services Team and other educational and provincial partners, on the development of a family version of the Linguistic Risk-Taking Passport. This version is in its final stages of development and will be piloted in key CLC schools in the 2019-2020 school year.

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

In addition to hosting a series of three virtual learning opportunities for CDAs on Early Childhood, LEARN was approached by an Early Transitions Officer to host a series of peer group exchanges, attended by Transition Agents from all English school boards.

In response to the increased requests for Early Childhood resources, the PRT is partnering with the Community Health and Social Services Network (CHSSN) and Literacy Quebec to develop a resource for parents of children 3 to 5 years old (Goodnight bag), to be distributed by CLC schools working together with their local community partners. Naître et Grandir and First Books Canada have committed to providing material to supplement the tools and resources developed by LEARN. Training for animators, benchmarking, and pilot-testing the Goodnight Bag will begin in the fall.

LEARN will be co-organizing an Early Childhood Symposium in 2020 aimed at increasing collaborative practices among educational institutions, community organizations and public institutions. It will provide a forum to share best practices in early childhood development in English-speaking communities across Quebec. The PRT is partnering with CHSSN, LCEEQ, MEES, the Secretariat for Relations with English-Speaking Quebecers, and Literacy Quebec.

Three organizations requested to partner with LEARN to offer resources and/or to be linked to CLC schools that offer early childhood programming.

Committee Participation

SCHOOL BOARD REPRESENTATIVES COMMITTEE

The School Board representatives serve as a planning and advisory group for the PRT, identifying areas of need and promoting increased support, communication and accountability between the school board and their CLC schools. This committee meets three times per year.

INCLUSIVE EDUCATION SERVICES (IES) COMMITTEE

The PRT recently was asked to join the IES committee, a provincial service mandated by the Québec Ministry of Education (Ministère de l'Éducation et de l'Enseignement supérieur – MEES) to offer support and expertise to the English sector for the organization of programs and adapted teaching for students with special learning needs. The CLC approach is a strategy that enriches learning, and contributes to increased student engagement and an improved sense of well-being and belonging.

INTER-LEVEL EDUCATIONAL TABLE (ILET)

The Quebec English-Speaking Communities Research Network (QUESCREN) formed the Inter-Level Educational Table (ILET) to bring representatives of Quebec's English-language educational institutions and associations, community groups and the public sector together to stimulate community vitality through the education sector.



PAN-CANADIAN COMMUNITY SCHOOL/COMMUNITY EDUCATION WORKING GROUP

Community school initiatives have been around since the 1970s, bringing schools and communities together for their mutual benefit. In Canada, however, there is a lack of research and data on the community school movement, and many working in the field would like to have access to Canadian data to support the development of their community school/ education initiatives.

Representatives from non-profit community organizations across Canada have organized to form a Canadian coalition with the aim of organizing a national knowledge exchange with researchers and interested groups in an effort to inform both Canadian and international research, debate, decisions and actions.



VANIER COLLEGE

Once again, the PRT partnered with a professor and students at Vanier College to offer an information session to high school students about the CEGEP experience. Three schools, located in remote areas of the province, participated. A member of

Vanier College's student services team also participated in an information session for parents

about supporting their child's transition to CEGEP. The parent information session was hosted via Facebook Live and was viewed 1.500 times.



ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS NETWORK (ELAN)

ΔCE INITIATIVE

By supporting Artists, community organizers, and educators to connect and develop projects with and for members of their community, the ACE approach creates innovative opportunities for lifelong learning, developing skills and connections that contribute to personal and community vitality for everyone involved. Since the inception of the ACE, the PRT has worked with ELAN to identify and involve CLC schools. This year, 13 of the 14 schools are members of the CLC network.

ARTISTSINSPIRE

ELAN and LEARN are collaborating to promote and support the ArtistsInspire grants. \$1500 is available to every English elementary and secondary school in Quebec, every year for the next 4 years. The PRT has already begun promoting the opportunity to the 86 schools in the CLC network with the goal of ensuring a 100% participation rate.

BIRD PROTECTION QUEBEC (BPQ)

The PRT partnered with BPO and Sheldon Harvey, a member of BPO and a passionate birder, to promote educational and grant opportunities to CLC schools. To showcase educational opportunities made possible by BPO and its members, the PRT collaborated with a teacher and CDA from Riverside School Board, as well as Sheldon Harvey, to host a webinar for educators and produce a blog post.

MOBILIZING & PARTNERING WITH COMMUNITY STAKEHOLDF

MEETINGS AND INITIATIVES WITH COMMUNITY PARTNERS

LEARN's PRT works with regionally and provincially mandated organizations to generate resources, programming and funding opportunities for schools belonging to the CLC network.

LA TABLÉE DES CHEFS

This past year La Tablée des Chefs partnered with LEARN's PRT to offer students from 5 schools in the CLC network the opportunity to discover the pleasure of cooking by creating excitement around food, healthy lifestyles, and community service. The feedback

from participating schools has been extremely positive and thanks to the partnership that LEARN's PRT has cultivated with La Tablée des Chefs, 15 English high schools in the CLC network will participate in this highlyvalued program next school year.

COMMUNITY HEALTH & SOCIAL SERVICES NETWORK (CHSSN)

HEALTH & WELLBEING INITIATIVES

LEARN'S PRT secured \$30K in grant funding for CLCs from the Community Health and Social Services Network (CHSSN) to develop initiatives that promote the social and emotional learning (SEL) competencies of students and their families.

As a result, new programs and activities were introduced across 16 schools in nine school boards. Initiatives included mindfulness workshops, animal therapy, mental health forums, girl empowerment

YOUTH FOR YOUTH (Y4Y)




