Students can join a research team, meet professionals, visit work facilities, try equipment (such as a scanner and a treadmill), and play games to discover the various jobs and career paths that are available in the biotechnology and health fields.

The mentorship program was an extremely positive professional development experience. Everyone in the program was so welcoming and helpful; there is always someone on call if you ever feel lost. All the mentors, even the ones you are not paired up with, are always eager to help. Everyone has his/her own style and you have the opportunity to select what works for you. I had the opportunity to visit two different POP classrooms in very different settings. Seeing the students in action was equally inspiring in both settings. Whenever I needed anything, someone always went out of his/her way to help. Many tools were put at my disposal. The program is so well organized I often found myself thinking, "If only it could be this simple for all the other subject areas." This program was a huge benefit, and the one-on-one interaction is what I appreciated the most. I look forward to sharing my own experiences with those who come after me!

In late March 2012, students enrolled in the Exploration of Vocational Training program in Québec's two largest English school boards participated in a very special event. In fact, it was the second year in a row that the English Montreal School Board (EMSB) and the Lester B. Pearson School Board (LBPSB) offered a day of hands-on activities showcasing some of the programs offered in the respective boards' vocational training centres. The event was organized collaboratively from with representatives the Educational Services and Vocational Training departments of the two boards and administrators from the participating centres. The students were treated to a slate of fun and engaging activities created by vocational training teachers, and the entire event was a great example of the "E" for "Experiential" activity from the "ORIE" model found in the Explo curriculum.

Students from LBPSB who visited the EMSB's Rosemount Technology Centre were able to get a taste of the Furniture Finishing program by applying a faux stone finish to a block of wood that they were able to take home. Others left with a piece they created on a lathe as an introduction to the Machining Techniques program, a product they set up and printed in Digital Layout and Printing, or pipes they had cut and soldered themselves in the Welding program.

At Lester B. Pearson's vocational training centres, EMSB students participated in equally fun and interesting activities. At Pearson Electrotechnology Centre, they had the chance to write HTML code for an actual video game in the Computing Support program, cut and attach connectors to coaxial cable in Telecommunications Equipment, and design and decorate a living room layout in Interior Decorating and Display. Students at PACC Vocational Centre saw a chicken literally turned inside out and deboned without a single knife stroke in the Butchery lab, learned how to fold beautiful napkins in Food and Beverage Service, and even left with their own delicious homemade truffles from the Pastry program!

This type of event goes well beyond the traditional tour. Vocational training centres throughout the province

offer a wide variety of programs in a large number of vocational training sectors, and they are eager to welcome students interested in a future with the trades. If you are an Explo teacher, contact your board's Career Development consultant to find out what can be arranged for the students in your board. Your activity may be "E" for "Experiential," but your students are sure to give it an A+!
